FCC RF EXPOSURE INFORMATION

In August 1996 the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) of the United States with its action in Report and Order FCC 96-326 adopted an updated safety standard for human exposure to radio frequency electromagnetic energy emitted by FCC regulated transmitters. Body-worn Operation

This device was tested for typical body-worn operations using a spacing of 1.5 cm between the phone and the body. To comply with FCC RF exposure requirements, a minimum separation distance of 1.5 cm must be maintained between the user's body and the phone, including the antenna, whether extended or retracted. The use of third-party belt-clips/ holsters with no metallic components that provide the minimum separation distance of 1.5 cm can be used to satisfy FCC RF exposure requirements.
